Adult Ed. Classes with Charlie Schmidtke Study Notes: Islam

Part 4 – Islamic Beliefs II

The 5 Pillars of Islam are at the heart of the religion, regardless of sect.

Testimony of Faith – *Shahadah* (*oath to God*). There is only one true God and his name is Allah; Mohammad is His Last Prophet (Messenger). God demands faith out of gratitude for creating humanity. Faith is never based on any particular situation or need. A true Muslim is one who continually trusts in divine assistance and support, and does not wait until an emergency arises before seeking God. The Quran condemns hypocrisy and feigned belief. Faith is a person's dedication to God's will and the recognition of His sovereignty. The 5 Pillars are particular deeds and behaviors that are essential aspects of faith and are demanded by God of every Muslim.

Prayer (Salat) 5x/day – In prayer the person feels inner happiness, peace and comfort. It is wrong to pray only in time of need. It is proper to wash before praying (Muslims have a deep need for purity, both physically and spiritually). Prayers are given at dawn, noon, mid-afternoon, sunset and at night. Prayer mats are for purity—so as not to touch the dirt on the ground. The positions of prayer are part of the connection to Allah. The call to prayer from a human voice was started with Mohammad. He also began turning to Mecca to pray after receiving a revelation from Allah to do so. Mecca, thus, became the spiritual center for Islam. All prayers end with a reference to Abraham; the father of faith and the father of the Arab people. On Fridays at the mosques a sermon is given after prayer by the Imam. Praying in public and at a Mosque is a symbol of one's spiritual commitment to Allah.

Almsgiving – Hospitality is a fundamental characteristic of Arab culture and became a guiding principle for Mohammad. It's called <u>Zakat</u>: supporting the needy with your income. "All things belong to Allah; wealth is held by humans in trust for Him." The original meaning for Zakat was purification and growth. Almsgiving became a way to grow and purify one's self.

Ramadan - A time of fasting (Sawm) from dawn until sundown for the entire month: no food, water, smoking, drinking anything, no chewing anything or swallowing anything (including medications, unless they are given through a vein or muscle) or sexual relations. It is a form of physical and spiritual self-purification. Its purpose is to develop compassion for those who are hungry and a way to provide growth in one's spiritual life. If you break the fast, then you are to: (a) fast for 60 days; (b.) feed 60 people a day's worth of food; and (c.) give a charity meal to 60 other people. Fasting exceptions include those who are pregnant, menstruating or have recently delivered. The feeble old, children, the sick and the insane are exempt. Ramadan nights are joyful. Families and friends may gather for food, singing and entertainment. Some go to a mosque for a retreat. Ramadan celebrates the month the Quran first came to Mohammad. It is also the month of the Battle of Badr-Mohammad overcoming the Meccans.

Haij – A Pilgrimage of self-renewal to Mecca at least once in a life time. It is a symbol for worldwide unity and equality. The Muslim religious calendar is a lunar-based calendar, which means Ramadan and the timing of the *Haij* "drift" along the solar calendar. For the Muslims it means that they want to experience

these practices across the seasons and not be tied to the secular world's calendar. Clothing is uniform and white. The reason is to eliminate any sign of status, distinctions or importance. This practice is based on Mohammad's demand to treat everyone equally. In 630 Mohammad led his followers from Medina to Mecca and cleansed the Kaaba by destroying all the pagan idols surrounding it; then he consecrated the building to God. In 632 Mohammad made his *Haij* with a large number of followers. He instructed them on the rites of the *Haij*, which made the pilgrimage one of the 5 pillars. The Ritual is based on history and culture.

To begin the Haij one goes into a spiritual state of holiness (*lhram*). In this state people are prohibited from clipping nails, shaving any part of the body, having sexual relations, using perfumes, damaging plants, killing animals, getting married or carrying weapons.

The traditional rites of the Haij include:

- Circle the Kaaba (Tawaf) 7 times counter-clockwise. People begin each circle by kissing or touching or pointing to the Black Stone and saying a prayer. People may drink water (to avoid dehydration) but no eating is allowed. This practice is based on an old Arab tradition of circling the Kaaba dating back to Abraham. Seven is a spiritual number which dates back to Pythagoras, a Greek mathematician and philosopher. He believed numbers have spiritual significance-7 is based on combining the natural world (4 directions) with the sacred (3 dimensions). The belief pervaded the ancient world. After completing the *Tawaf* people go to another part of the Mosque and pray. Traditionalists believe that the Kaaba was built by Adam after leaving the Garden. Most Muslims believe it was built by Abraham to be the house of worship for all humanity. The Kaaba is located inside the Al-Masjid al-Haram Mosque. This is the most sacred space in all of Islam. Facing Mecca is really facing the Kaaba. The Mosque was built around the Kaaba which literally means cube.
- b. Walking briskly 7 times between the hills of Safa and Marwah. This is a way of repeating Hagar's search for water when she and Ishmael were dismissed by Sarah and Abraham and exiled into the desert. She ran 7 times between the two hills, keeping an eye on Ishmael while also looking for signs of water. When she returned to Ishmael, the baby had scratched the ground with his leg and a water fountain sprang up beneath his foot. Abraham was commanded to build the Kaaba with Ishmael and invite people to make a pilgrimage to it.
- c. Drink from the Zamzam well.
- d. Go to the plains of Mount Arafat (12 miles east of Mecca) to stand vigil.
- e. Spend a night in the plain of Muzdalifa on the ground and under the sky. In the morning perform a symbolic stoning of the Devil by throwing 7 pebbles at 3 pillars. After the sacrifice of an animal (or voucher) the men either shave their beard or head and women trim the ends of their hair.
