## Pastor's Ponderings

### UNITY IN CHRIST!

"I... beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, **bearing with one another** in love, making every effort to maintain the **unity** of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Ephesians 4:1-3

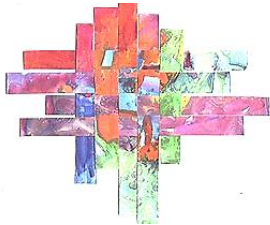
Paul writes of the importance of unity and working together as the body of Christ. He believes we are called to be church together in community. In 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians, Paul describes the church as a human body where all parts, from the ears to the toes, are important and work together to make church happen and bring about God's kingdom.

Recently in the Buffalo News, columnist David Brooks shared his opinion about the notion of working together. Being a relational country instead of an individual country. He called those who seek to be in relationship with other people "Weavers." He believes that our country is suffering from social isolation and fragmentation, which is exhibited by "our lack of healthy connection to each other, our inability to see the full dignity of each other, and the resulting culture of fear, distrust, tribalism, and strife."

David has found in his travels around the United States that each community has "Weavers." "Weavers share an ethos that puts relationship over self. 'We' precedes 'me.'" He meets "Weavers" who "live for others and are more joyful as a result."

David is essentially saying that we are called into community to "bear one another's burdens." What this takes is risk, effort, and commitment towards the other. Committing to: the single parents who are working two jobs to provide for their families and need childcare or a listening ear... the drug addict who needs people to listen and support every time they go back to being sober or rehab, as long as it takes... the person of color or of a different nationality or religion who we work with or live near who needs a friend or respect or defense against those who would malign them.

We as the body of Christ need to lead this movement instead of avoiding it. David challenges the readers of his column to be a "Weaver" instead of a "ripper" of the fabric of our nation.



One of my favorite—and most challenging—statements of Jesus comes from Matthew in which Jesus tells a parable of "the Son of Man who comes in his glory" and divides the people into sheep and goats. The goats are those who are "rippers" and the sheep are the "Weavers." The Son of Man will say to the sheep... "as you

did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." The family of the Son of Man are... the hungry, thirsty, stranger, sick, and imprisoned.

A Lenten discipline might be for us to encourage each other to weave and not to rip, to bring together and not divide, to do what Jesus would do! WWJD – WEAVE.

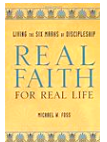

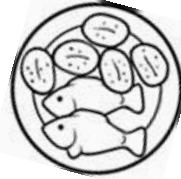
### Prayer for Trinity Old Lutheran and Augustana Lutheran Churches

Augustana has been helping refugees and immigrants for over 25 years, and the current program began in 2007 as a way to help individuals earn their driver licenses.

Participants receive referrals from local agencies including Catholic Charities, Jewish Family Service, the International Institute, Journey’s End and local schools—and there is always a waiting list to enter the program. Those who graduate contribute their time and share their knowledge with current students.

Having a driver’s license allows individuals to gain better access to employment opportunities, healthcare, neighborhoods and schools, as well as to become involved in community activities.

Over the years, Augustana volunteers have assisted over 100 participants from 30 different countries. In addition to those receiving their licenses, others have earned their driving permits.

## TOL’s Caregivers Support Group

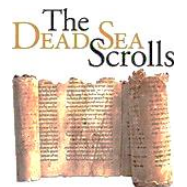

## Defining Faith

How do we define faith? Well, a good dictionary says “belief that is not based on proof” and goes on, “belief in God or in the doctrines or teachings of religion.” Pretty basic stuff. Turning to Hebrews 11, we find

Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen...By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

And Hebrews 11 has sections devoted to the faith of Abraham in offering up Isaac; of Moses choosing to share ill treatment with his people; of the Israelites passing through the Red Sea; before moving on to a longer study (in Hebrews 12) of Jesus’ faith.



Paul’s letter to the Ephesians 2:8 says, “For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God.” And a footnote to that verse in the Harper Study Bible has this to say:

Salvation is secured by faith alone; this excludes any and all human works of righteousness. True saving faith always has in it three elements, each of which is necessary: (1) knowledge, for no one is saved without knowing something (Rom 10) (2) mental consent to the knowledge, i.e. one is convinced in his or her mind that the good news is true; and (3) laying hold of Christ by a personal act of the will—i.e. receiving Jesus Christ as one’s Saviour.

There’s an old story about a preacher who spoke on the relationship between faith and fact. He said, “That you are sitting here before me in this church is a fact. That I am standing here speaking to you from this pulpit is a fact. That I believe anyone is actually listening to me is pure faith.

Another definition of faith is “the belief that God knows what He is doing, even when we don’t fully understand.
