Pastor's Ponderings

I am getting a new Bible. It's called NRSVue. The NRSV has been called the most accurate English-language translation. However, in the thirty years since its first publication hundreds of manuscripts have been studied in exacting detail to inform our understanding of the ancient languages they were written in and the cultural use of language at the time the manuscripts were written.

I am excited to use this NRSVue in my study and prep for sermons. I am also excited for the Lutheran Study Bible and its side-notes, questions, and insights that the publishers give me.

Can you believe it, the Bible can be updated because we know more about the time and culture when it was written.

The time and culture the Bible was written in is totally different from the culture of today. So just as the editorial committee of NRSVue thought to update, we too must be in constant interaction with the Bible and updating what it means for us today.

My work with the Bible and Jesus teachings has led me from an archaic understanding of humankind, when DNA, atoms, disease origins, and so much more that we learned from science was not known. So my study has led me and so many other Christians to see God's love to be all encompassing and including the people of the LGBTQAI+ community.

It is true we ALL sin and fall short of the Glory of God, and that we ALL are made in the image of God. Therefore, God's Love extends to ALL. This is a simple explanation of a long-contemplated situation for me, the church, and in the world.

During Pride Month, I am here to say, I stand with my siblings in Christ and know that God's Love through Jesus is bigger than we can comprehend.

I hope this helps us in our journey into the ever-updating Bible (because of new research), to challenge and strengthen our beliefs in our present day culture and time period.

On Friday, May 30, five of us from TOL volunteered at Friends of Night People, an organization that supports those in need with food, clothing, medical care, and

counseling. Each of us was assigned a task—serving food or beverages, distributing toiletries, or helping in the clothing room. Between 5:00 and 7:00 PM, we served 149 people. It was a humbling experience that reminded us of the deep needs in our community.

As we've seen on previous volunteer nights, everyone is treated with dignity. No questions are asked—anyone in need is welcomed for a meal and given essentials like clothing, toiletries and, when available, baked goods, bread, and produce. One touching moment was seeing the joy on a young woman's face when she found a gently-worn pair of sneakers in her size.

We're grateful for the chance to serve and we encourage others to be part of this vital ministry. In the coming weeks, we'll also be collecting donations of much-needed items. Right now, there is a particular need for men's socks and underwear (new, in packaging), and travel-size toiletries such as body wash and hand sanitizer. A complete list of needed supplies will be included in upcoming Sunday bulletins. Please bring your donations to the collection box in the donation center near the coat room.

Boggled

"Boggled: to be very surprised, confused or uncertain about something."

How many times have you said, "this is mind-boggling" or "I am so boggled right now"?

Things can be going along pretty smoothly when out of the blue we get boggled. It happens to everyone along Life's path, in large and small ways. When this happens, I try to summon my four coping mechanisms.

- 1. "Look for the helpers. There always are helpers." These are the wise words from Mr. Rogers, which have served me time and again.
- **2.** Be open to serendipity and signs. They come unexpectedly; they make me gasp; they make me smile; they feed my soul.
- **3.** Hang on to certainty. For me this has come to mean the "International Space Station."

For a few years we have been spending time with the night sky. We check the ISS website for time, direction and altitude. We set a timer. Adult Ed. Classes with Charlie Schmidtke Study Notes: Jesus and Thomas

Part II: Thomas, the Faithful Servant and Jesus

We celebrate Easter as a single celebration. For Thomas and the others, it was very, very different. Mary Magdalene runs up and says Jesus is gone. They all think she's crazy and worry that the Jewish authorities or the Romans would blame them and start persecuting them. The apostles started having endless debates about what to do-could Mary Magdalene be right? What really happened to his body? The arguments and worry went on for days. Judas never returned to the group after the crucifixion and Thomas took over Judas' job of providing food and necessities for the apostles. Where was Thomas when Jesus first appeared to the apostles? He was out getting food and trying to get information about what was going on; he was trying to save everyone's necks the apostles and other disciples who were hiding with them. So, think about Thomas' response when the apostles tell him they saw Jesus. First, he didn't trust them very much because they may have seemed almost hysterical at times; then they tell him that a dead man was in their midst. What would you have said; what would any of the other apostles have said? Probably what Thomas said: prove it. It's not that Thomas doubted Jesus; he just didn't trust or believe the apostles. No one had ever brought himself back from the dead. Thomas saw Jesus raise Lazarus, but who can raise himself from the dead?

Think about Thomas' response when he saw Jesus. He had no doubt that Jesus had performed this greatest of all miracles. He wouldn't have understood how it happened—who could? After Jesus appeared, the apostles would have started to rethink their purpose and mission. Thomas would still have attended to the practical things and probably never fit in with the rest of them. They went back and forth to Galilee but were in Jerusalem for the Pentecost. Jesus' brother James was also with the apostles and probably began to assume some leadership in Jerusalem. In fact, after Pentecost James was the leader in Jerusalem. The final chapter in turning this ragtag group of apostles into real leaders and missionaries for Jesus came at Pentecost. Without the inspiration and strength given to the apostles by the Holy Spirit, I don't think much would have happened with Jesus' gospel message to the world. I think it took the power of the Holy Spirit to move the apostles out of their hiding place and proclaim the good news to the world. After Pentecost, the apostles and all of the others who were there would have been given a strength and commitment that changed the world forever. Pentecost was the most exciting experience for all of Jesus' followers. The bible indicates there were at least 120 followers who directly received the grace given by the Holy Spirit on that day. Don't just think it was the apostles. It would have included Jesus' mother, probably his siblings, the wives and children of the apostles who were married, Mary, Martha and Lazarus, of course, Mary Magdalene and those who would become deacons later. Unfortunately, we don't have a comprehensive list of who was present at Pentecost and we don't know what each one did afterward.

Think about the experience. One moment they're talking and arguing endlessly and the next moment there was a wind, and then tongues of fire. All of them were renewed and buoyed. All the confusion about Jesus' parables and life slipped away and his message became clear. They all finally understood

what Jesus meant and why he said and did what he did. We know they ran out into the streets and began their ministry. However, I think it is naïve to believe that all of them understood Jesus in the same way. There were common meanings that they shared (the Resurrection, sharing the bread and wine, caring for the poor and marginalized, making love central in one's life, etc.), but all that Jesus taught would have been understood in wavs common to each personality and background. That's why we have apostles creating a Coptic Church in Egypt, a Syriac Church in Antioch, an Armenian Church in Armenia, a Roman Church in Rome, a Jewish/Christian Church in Jerusalem and eventually Orthodox Churches in Greece and Asia Minor (Turkey). The five early centers of Christianity were: Jerusalem, Alexandria, Antioch, Constantinople, and Rome. Armenia, Greece and India became regional centers also. These centers never really agreed on everything and schisms and splits occurred over the centuries. In the US, we typically only hear about the split between the Roman Church and the Greek Orthodox Church.

Politics and human foibles have always been a part of the church—even back in the beginning among the apostles. Thomas was more of a leader than a follower. I don't think he got along with Peter and James. In fact, they told Thomas that it would be best if he carried Christ's message away from Jerusalem—away from them and what they were trying to do. They wanted everyone to be a good Jew first, before being baptized in Jesus' word. Thomas' gospel gives us a different understanding of what it meant to follow Jesus. Thomas was sent to what is now called Syria, but he continued on to India. Thomas probably provided the material for the gospel attributed to him, and his followers wrote an Acts According to Thomas. Thomas brought Jesus' message to people who were not Jewish and who were not culturally Greek or Roman or Palestinian. The Christians who have followed Thomas' message are different from those who followed Peter and the Roman Church or those who followed Constantine and the Orthodox Church or those who became Coptic believers or those who belong to the Armenian Church. We hear about Thomas the doubter, but not Thomas the founder of a large Christian Church with works not included in the bible.
