Pastor's Ponderings

“...for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. Jesus sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all.” Mark 9:34-35

When I was in fifth grade, I rode my bike a mile to school through our village. I was proud to be a fifth grader. In our elementary school fifth grade was the highest grade. I was so proud to be a fifth grader that one day, I remember this vividly, I was riding my bike past younger children in lower grades on my way home from school. I was riding my bike without my hands on the handle bars. They were probably either straight up in the air or laid smugly across my stomach. Passing all the younger children from the middle of the road, I yelled, “I’m a big fifth grader!” (or something of the sort). I was showing off and claiming my greatness. As I was proclaiming my superiority, I hit a bump in the road and fell off my bike scraping my skin, tearing my clothes, causing bruising on my body—but mostly I experienced embarrassment. (How the mighty have fallen—lol!)

I thought about this incident from my past when I read the above quote from Mark. It reminded me of Jesus’ other quote in Matthew that the ‘last shall be first and the first shall be last.’ I displayed hubris, and claimed to be number one, whereas the truth with Jesus is that those who are first or number one are not the greatest but are the oppressed, the widow, the child, the stranger, and the poor. The Last are first. The Least of these are priority.

“Then he took a little child and put it among them, and taking it in his arms, he said to them, “Whoever welcomes on such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.” Mark 9:36-37

So what is the big fifth grader’s calling? What is the well off, healthy, cisgender male, employed, and nonimmigrant’s calling?

To be the servant. To recognize our privilege and support others in becoming safe, whole, employed, protected, fed, housed and strengthened in our society.

Falling on the ground helped me realize that I am called to help lift people up off the ground to a better place.

Maybe this holiday season we can be a lifter of our fellow siblings.

Adult Ed. Classes with Charlie Schmidtke
Study Notes: "Mary of Magdala"

Part I: Who was Mary Magdalene?

Magdala is a city on the northwest corner of the Sea of Galilee, near Capernaum. Jesus spent a lot of time in this area during his early ministry. Mary probably was a wealthy woman involved in managing or owning a fishing business. The best guess is that she was between 30-50 years old when she met Jesus. She may have provided financial support to Jesus and his early followers. She probably funded her own ministry after Pentecost. The French believe that she and some of the other women in the New Testament took boats from Judaea and landed in southern France. They spread the Word and brought Christ to the people of France. We need to be careful about not trying to interpret her as a 21st century woman. She was a 1st century Jewish woman. Let's look at her from the eyes of the Gospels. Next month we will finish looking at her in our gospels and then turn to her gospel. Before turning to the gospels, I want to point out the confusions with the name of Mary and of Mary Magdalene specifically.

Confusions

- A. There is an adultery story in Luke 7:36-50. This story is about an unnamed woman. Unfortunately for history, Pope Gregory Great (591 CE) mistakenly, or willfully, identified this woman as Mary Magdalene leading to her characterization as a prostitute. Many people still believe his mistake. This is clearly not Mary because in the next passage (8:1-3), Luke identifies Mary as one of the women following Jesus who once had seven demons. The passage Gregory used is the story of Simon the Pharisee and a sinful woman washing Jesus' feet. Did the Pope give this sermon out of ignorance or out of malice? Since the 3rd century, the male clergy was trying to get rid of the female clergy, including female bishops. There are paintings and records of the female clergy and bishops up through the 4th century. There are also letters from male bishops asking the pope to get rid of the females.
- B. Mary of Bethany in Matthew anointed Jesus with oil. Not Mary M.
- C. Mark has a story at Simon the Leper's with a woman pouring oil on Jesus' feet and angering guests. This was not Mary M.
- D. Here are some of the Mary's we find in the gospels.
 1. Mary, Jesus' mother
 2. Mary Magdalene
 3. Mary and Martha, Lazarus' sisters
 4. Mary, wife of Zebedee and mother of James and John (apostles); maybe called Salome
 5. Mary, wife of Alphaeus, mother of James (a second apostle named James) and Joseph/Joses
 6. Mary Salome who may be #4 or Jesus' maternal aunt who helped at his birth and travelled to Egypt
 7. Mary, wife of Cleopas (who was either Joseph's brother or the disciple on the road to Emmaus).
 8. Mary, mother of John Mark (probable gospel writer who accompanied Paul and Barnabas). She gives Peter refuge in Jerusalem. Barnabas and Peter were probably friends.
 9. Mary, a Christian in Rome, who meets with Paul.

Mary Magdalene in the Gospels:

1. Going with Jesus

Luke 8:1-3 – Mary Magdalene was one of the women traveling with Jesus who once had seven demons in her. Were the seven demons really a form of schizophrenia, bi-polar, autism, clinical depression, epilepsy or neuroses? These diagnoses didn't exist at the time, so anyone who would have exhibited any of the conditions would have been seen as possessing a demon. If she was a business woman, her "possession" could not have been so crippling as to make her incompetent. Two other women included Joanna, the wife of a steward to Herod, and Susanna. There are no details available about who Susanna may have been or why she is included; it is possible that she was wealthy and helped support Jesus' followers.

2. At the Cross and Jesus' Burial

Mark 15:40 – Mary was at the cross, along with Mary the mother of James the lesser (son of Alphaeus). Salome was also there. Salome may either be the mother of James and John, married to Zebedee (known as Mary Salome OR a half-sister of Mary). There is speculation that Mary's mother, Anne, had one or two other daughters with unknown husbands. Salome may have helped with Jesus' birth and traveled with the family in Egypt.

Mark 15:47 – Mary M. and Mary the mother of Joseph (also of James, married to Alphaeus) were present when Joseph of Arimathea placed Jesus' body in the tomb.

Matthew 27:61 – Mary is present when Jesus is put in the tomb.

3. Easter

Matthew 28:1-10 – Mary M. and the "other" Mary (wife of Zebedee or wife of Alphaeus) went to the tomb. There was a strong earthquake and the Lord's angel came from heaven. Guards shook with fear and fell down. An angel told Mary not to fear because God had raised Jesus from the dead. The angel told them to go to the disciples and tell them. Jesus met and greeted them as they ran. Jesus told them to tell the disciples to go to Galilee and they will see Jesus there. (This was important because Jesus eats with disciples in Galilee proving that he had totally risen from the dead and wasn't just a ghost.)

We'll finish a look at Mary M. in the gospels in the next issue.
