In November we saw a former skateboard champion who was desperately searching for meaning in his life after a lonely, unhappy childhood. He made a pilgrimage to the Kaaba in Saudi Arabia. The second section focused on two warring factions in Nigeria. Each leader—a Christian and a Muslim—hated each other and urged their followers to aim for the death and destruction of the other group... until a news reporter got them together for conversation. The third section introduced us to a mother whose son had been murdered. How could she find a way to forgive and bring her heart some peace? She visited the murderer in prison and we saw God at work.

We had interesting conversations on forgiveness, grief, addiction, regret and hope.

Study Notes: Islam

Part 3 - Islamic Beliefs I

Here's a quick summary of what Mohammad believed.

- He restored belief in one God who was all powerful, majestic and deserving of worship. He also restored faith in Abraham.
- Islam means submission or surrender to Allah. Each Muslim has a personal relationship with Allah as His servant or slave. We commune with Allah through praise and prayer.
- God will come on the last judgment at the end of the world. We should prepare ourselves to go to heaven.
- God demands moral behavior, such as chastity, obedience, generosity to poor, orphaned, weak and outcast.
- Always have awe and gratitude to God.
- Unity and uniformity in religion is essential because it must reflect God's unity and greatness.
- Quran condemns those who call upon God only in their times of need and then forgets God afterward.
- Quran condemns hypocrisy, especially those who act so they can receive benefits from their beliefs.
- Paradise is promised to those who pray humbly; have no sexual relations except with one's spouse; use their wealth honestly; and follow their duty.
- Humans are born good; there is no original sin.
- There should be no graven images. This follows from Abraham who destroyed his father's workshop images. When the west depicts Allah or Mohammad in a picture, it is insulting to all Muslims.
- Islam means surrender to Allah. There is to be no compulsion; no forced converts. Mohammad is Allah's messenger.

Islam began in Arabia and has been influenced by Arabian culture. Arabia was historically polytheistic and most of the gods were considered to be protectors. It was a tribally based culture which emphasized hospitality, humanism, honor, manliness and equitable distribution of goods. There were hundreds of different tribes throughout the area and there was no central form of governing. Participating in raids on other tribes displayed courage, and was usually vengeful showing a devotion to one's Genealogy. There were few cities and was comprised of independent nomadic tribes with fragile alliances. People were conservative and not accepting of change. They raised camels, sheep and were hunters. Caravans usually had body guards to fight off raids. Allah was the chief god among many; he had three daughters who were female gods. He was the god of trading in Mecca and going to the Kaaba in Mecca's town square on a pilgrimage was a way to honor him. To honor its maker, Adam, tribes called a truce each year so everyone could make a pilgrimage to Mecca and circle the Kaaba counterclockwise, usually seven times. Arabia's language was Semitic, like the Aramaic of Palestine/Israel during Jesus' life. The establishment of Arab culture came from Ishmael's sons who blended their beliefs with the Canaanite ways of their wives. In essence they shared the same basic cultural traits with Jewish/Canaanite tribes. The Canaanite highest god was named EL: both Yahweh and Allah are derivatives of this name. Nabateans (an ethnic group that

overlapped Arab and Jewish peoples) lived in Southern Palestine, Southern Jordan and Northern Saudi Arabia. John the Baptist may have been a Nabatean and one of the reasons Herod really beheaded him was because Herod feared an Arab based revolt headed by John and the Essenes.

Here are some basic cultural traits for Arabs.

- Paternal ancestry determines family membership.
- Women remain members of the father's family; only recently have some women begun adopting their husband's name.
- The oldest male settles all domestic disputes.
- Honoring one's family is very important – this carries kinship obligations throughout life.
- Female chastity and children's obedience are expected.
- Weddings are pivotal events. From the time of Abraham marrying cousins strengthens families and when a husband dies, the brother-in-law steps in to marry the widow.
- Sustain honor, courage and manliness.
- Their private space is 6"—for Americans the space is 18".
- People are expected to talk nose to nose, so touching and feeling the breath from another's face is important. Failing to breathe in another's face signals fear or shame.
- Speech is usually high volume which reflects one's sincerity.
- Silence, not necessarily distance or walls, is used to establish privacy.
- Space needs to be unobstructed, with high ceilings. (A primary characteristic of mosques.)
- The language is the primary identifying trait since Arabs are light, dark, and black. They include ethnic minorities like Nubians, Kurds and Berbers.
- They began as Fellahin (farmers/shepherds) and Bedouin (nomads).
- Originally a person was identified with his/her tribe; now it is with religion, nation or city.

Today: Twenty percent of Muslims in the world are Arab and ten percent of Arabs are Christian. Eighty percent of the world's Muslim population is non-Arab with Indonesia being the most populated Muslim country in the world. In Mohammad's day northern Arabia was controlled by Christian Byzantines whose authority was in Constantinople. The East was controlled by Persia (today, Iran) and the rest was Arab clan culture. Each tribe had its own patron god and Mecca was seen as the center of a polytheistic world.
